## **Order of Adjectives**

- ★ **Opinion** adjectives (*beautiful, interesting, etc.*) go before **fact** adjectives (*dark, ancient, wooden, etc.*). This is an **eye-catching marble** sculpture.
- ★ When there are two or more adjectives of the same category, **the more general** adjective goes **before the more specific** one, e.g, an **attractive**, **thought-provoking** painting.
- ★ When there are two or more fact adjectives in a sentence they normally go in the following order:

★ Nouns which express purpose, material or substance (*work, bronze, gold, etc.*) can be used as adjectives before the nouns, e.g.: *This is a decorative porcelain cup*.
